

Incoming AME20 Committee Chair

Dr. Hilary Nixon has been an active member of AME20 since 2019, serving as a committee Friend prior to then, and most recently served as the Program Co-Chair of the 2019 Women's Issues in Transportation Conference Planning Committee. Hilary currently serves as Deputy Executive Director for the Mineta Transportation Institute (MTI) of San José State University (SJSU), a position she has held since 2018. Previously, she served as MTI's Director of Research and Technology Transfer and spent 12 years as faculty in the Department of Urban & Regional Planning at SJSU, serving in a number of roles, including Department Chair. Hilary's research spans transportation and environmental planning and policy, including transportation finance and the relationship between transportation and the environment. Outside of her academic work, Hilary regularly advocates for women's interests through professional service, including her service as Vice President of the Faculty Women's Interest Group (FWIG) of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Planning from 2013-2015.

WEBINAR RECAPS

ICYMI:

Monday March 8, 2021: Where are the Women?

In collaboration with the Women Transportation Seminar (WTS), the AME20 committee hosted Wei-Shiuen Ng from International Transport Forum (ITF) and Andree Woodcock from Coventry University. Paula Hammond, the WTS International Board Chair, opened up the webinar and made sure to wish everyone a Happy International Womens Day! Lois Goldman, Director of Regional Planning at the North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority served as moderator.

Wei-Shiuen Ng highlighted her research at ITF on gender equality, digitalization, equality, and accessibility. Two main aspects related to gender in transport that ITF researched involves women as transport users as well as women in the transport workforce. With the objective to better understand the types of barriers that exist in presenting gender equality in transport and provide policy insight, the research found that only 17% (2018) of the transport workforce is female (data from 46 countries) and the field is still male dominated.


Andree Woodcock shared her research and the TInnGO (Transport Innovation Gender Observatory) project which was sponsored by the European Union to help shift in "the way gender is regarded in the transport sector". Her work recognizes the key issues including: gender transport poverty, intersectionality, and agency. The work focuses on new approaches to data collection and design research; efforts to close data gaps with an integrated and collaborative approach to data collection and data sharing.

EMERGING RESEARCHER'S SHOWCASE FEATURING ANIA MCDONNELL

Ania McDonnell's interest in the intersection of gender and transportation was first sparked when she took a course on gender policy during her graduate studies at the University of Minnesota. One particular example, Ania recalls, was the concept that snow clearing schedules have the ability to be gendered, impacting women and caregivers more than men in society. After further research on gender and transportation, what she found "confirmed everything

[she] had been feeling."

To date, Ania's area of research has focused on comprehensive city plans and their inclusion/exclusion of gendered language. In this work for her Master's degree, she found that there was little to no consideration of gender differences in the area of transportation and from this, that it is "key for local leaders and planners to understand and implement gender considerations into planning in the future to improve our communities." Her Master's Professional Paper entitled "Gender Mainstreaming City Comprehensive Plans: a Transportation Focus" has gained recognition by news outlets in Minnesota, including MinnPost and The Minnesota Daily.



From Ania's perspective, the concept of gender mainstreaming is the "concept of embedding gender diverse needs into all policies and plans" – a concept she mentions is widely used in Europe today in the area of transportation planning. Moving forward, she believes "all planners should include gender mainstreaming in their policies and practices to ensure that what they are doing is including all voices and perspectives." Motivated to make these changes, Ania has continued to lead in the area of gender research in transportation as Co-Founder of a group called the Gender Equity in Transportation Collaboration (GET Collaborative) in Minnesota. She describes this collaborative as a "group of individuals who are passionate about the topic of gender and transportation, want to push the conversation forward to change transportation, and to include diverse voices in the planning and policymaking process."
